- 1) Please pick up a book and peruse its pages of prose (I recently read Viola Davis's biography, *Finding Me* highly recommend!).
- 2) Make an audible selection listen to a lovely literary litany.
- 3) Call an old friend and communicate memorable moments.

Regardless of format, seek stories.

I've been reading, listening to, and telling stories since I first learned to spell bologna's first name. For as long as I can remember, my beautiful mother — Mary Catherine — read to me. My maternal manuscript magistrate would reenact stories with such passion that my mind would orbit her inspiration galaxy; my body was suddenly forced to watch

and wave. Our story time rituals brought me so much joy that after each turned page, a cacophony of bubbles burst overhead, showering my mother and me with messy squeals. Interview of Ramona J. Smith by Jessica Thompson

It took Ramona J. Smith three years to get to the World Championship stage. She competed in several club contests and even placed 3rd at the District Level. However, she still felt defeated during the process. "I was ego driven," Ramona said. "I wanted to win. I wanted the trophy, and I wanted to say I was the World Championship Speaker." It was not until she had

a complete mind shift that she began to climb the ladder to the World Championship stage. "I started to firmly believe in myself by achieving goals," she said. "Taking that energy into 2018 helped me not to lean so much into the trophy, because whether you gave me the trophy or not, I already knew I was a champion."

On August 25th, 2018, Ramona surpassed ~30,000 other speakers from around the world to become the 2018 World Champion of Public Speaking in Chicago, IL. Her speech, titled "Still Standing," delved into how she overcame several life challenges such as dropping out of college, divorce and falling short during a few speech contests. "We are all Toastmasters, and we all experience ups and downs but even though we go through those challenges we still overcome. We still rise up," she said.

Ramona's journey began in 2010. In her hometown Cleveland, Ohio, she joined her local Toastmasters club to polish her skills as a motivational speaker. "I loved the culture of the club," she said. "Everyone was friendly, everybody was happy, and it was fun. And I was doing something I loved to do." She later moved to Hawthorne, California, and joined a corporate Toastmasters club where she started to become interested in participating in club contests. In 2015,

Ramona was sponsored by a friend to attend the Toastmasters' World Championship of Public Speaking at Caesars Palace in Las Vegas, Nevada, as a spectator and see the magic of public speaking unfold on the World Championship stage. "When you have a dream and you really want to experience it, you have to

put yourself in that environment."

Ramona knew early on that she wanted to be a public speaker, even before knowing she could turn it into a profession. "I always loved being on the stage and just having that control. I love bringing that energy to a large group of people. I love the impact. I love the results." When she witnessed World Champion Mohammad Qahtani win on the World Championship stage in 2015, the spark was lit. "I know I can do this. I know I want to do this, and I am going to do this," she said at that time.

time motivational speaker. With this shift in her career, she said she was "finally able to take myself seriously as a public speaker." Ramona visited various countries such as Dubai, Oman, Qatar, Sri Lanka, Kuwait, India, Malaysia, Brazil, India, Saudi Arabia and other district conferences as the newly minted World Champion. "Toastmasters gave me that exposure," she said. Ramona was the second African-American woman and the fifth woman overall to win the public-speaking championship since it started in 1938. Another historic first was that three women took the top three spots: Zifang "Sherrie" Su (2nd place) and Anita Fain Taylor (3rd place). Additionally, the Toastmasters International President was a woman that year: Lark Doley, DTM. Ramona is proud to be part of this historic year: "I'm in the history books for that one, this made me walk in my purpose fully." She also wants her fellow Toastmasters to do the same to walk in their purpose and take advantage of the available tools Toastmasters International has to

you are wasting your money," she said. "No one is saying you must make it to the World Championship stage, but it's going to develop your skills. So, why not take advantage of this investment you have been making for all these years." As Ramona continues to accelerate towards her public speaking and entrepreneurial goals, she also plans to assist others to do the same. She wants to train children in public speaking and continue to educate future leaders. Not only does she have a YouTube channel (https://www.youtube.com/user/ monalisa110) and website (https:// www.ramonajsmith.com/) where she gives tips and coaching services regarding public speaking, but she has also inspired her 10-year-old son to do the same. "I put the microphone in his hand," she said. "I don't want him to have that fear." Moreover, the support she receives from her husband, family and friends also makes the experience that much more rewarding. She has no plans for slowing down when it comes to public speaking and focusing on becoming a brilliant businesswoman. "I'm going to always be a speaker ... and I'm even going to learn sign language – in case something happens to

my voice - because I was born to do this."

Home Club: Broadview Toastmasters

Which level(s) of the Toastmaster Speech contest have you participated in? Club, Area, Division, District, Regional Quarterfinal and Semifinals

Why did you initially decide to

participate in the speech contest? I joined Toastmasters in January 2009. During my first meeting they mentioned that the club was looking for members to compete in the International Speech Contest (ISC). I am a competitive person, by nature, so signed up. I never thought anything would happen. It just sounded like fun.

What was your biggest takeaway from taking on the challenge of competing? Did you learn anything about yourself? For me, the best part about competing in any of the Toastmasters contests is learning how to tell a story. I love the whole concept of having only seven minutes and thirty seconds to bring everything all together. All your feelings and emotions, right there, for one brief and shining moment. It is an absolutely indescribable feeling, to stand there on the stage, just you, the audience and your story. For me, the contests took away decades of anger and self-esteem issues. Competing in the contests taught me that I had something to say that people actually wanted to listen to.

Are you planning on participating in future speech contests? Why or why not? Absolutely! In my mind, the best thing about Toastmasters are the speech contests. I love the challenge of competing, it is epic. I especially like competing against people who seem to think it's easy to win a Toastmasters speech championship. Even after winning a total of six District-level championships, I can assure you that it is not.

What is one piece of advice you would give a Toastmaster who has never competed in a speech contest?

To have any hope of winning at any level, especially at the District level, then you have got to tell a story. A speech will never beat a story! You have to TELL A STORY; something that has meaning for you. Something that you are passionate about. If you tell a story from your heart... you will be very difficult to beat. I got to the District level of ISC only after being in Toastmasters for four months... Why? Because I talked about something that I loved: "Star Wars. It was a life-changing experience for me.

Then after attending my first TLI, I ran on stage and declared "I will be on this stage soon winning an award." So I made my declaration came true!
What was your biggest takeaway from taking on the challenge of competing? Did you learn anything about yourself?	I wasn't good enough	I learned that with motivation and a coach, it is possible to win and place! In 2011, I won 3rd place in the D30 speech contest! It took courage, persistence and a willingness to step out of my comfort zone.
Are you planning on participating in future speech contests? Why or why not?	Yes	Preparing to win a contest takes a time commitment that I cannot do again any time soon. I am not more interested now in coaching others and building new clubs.
What is one piece of advice you would give a Toastmaster who has never competed in a speech contest?	Just try!	Just do it! Get a good coach and an accountability partner. That will make a huge difference.

Which level(s) of the Toastmaster Speech contest have you participated in?	Club, Area, Division and District	Club, Area and Division
Why did you initially decide to participate in the speech contest?	I was encouraged by my Area Director.	First time, no one else was interested in competing in the International Speech, and I wanted our club to be represented at Area, so I competed – and lost. That made me want to try again, and that second time I got up to Division level.
What was your biggest takeaway from taking on the challenge of competing? Did you learn anything about yourself?	Understanding that confidence is key, you are telling this story. There is no wrong way to tell your story. Tapping into the communication skills developed during Toastmaster's journey will equip you for success. I was able to conquer my fears, speak with passion and tell my story.	I had to keep improving my speech for the next level. I learned that I have way too much to say in 5-7 minutes, and it's challenging to get enough time and focus to really hone a speech for competitive purposes, but it was worth it – I got much more audience engagement (some good laughs!) the last time I gave that speech.
Are you planning on participating in future speech contests? Why or why not?	Yes, I want to try again. I made it to the District level and believe I can grace that stage again.	Not at this time. I'm more focused on helping put on contests, so others can have the opportunity to compete.
What is one piece of advice you would give a Toastmaster who has never competed in a speech contest?	In the words of my Granny, "Nothing beats failure but a try!". You will never know what's in you until you try. The fact that you faced your fears, took the stage and gave your voice a platform, this will become your motivation and strength over anxiety and fear of failure.	Figure out your memorable message. Support this message with every word, story and sub-point – then close crisply reiterating what you want your audience to remember.

As Program Quality Director (aka PQD), I have been constantly monitoring members' progression through Pathways — enrollment, engagement and excellence. I am proud to share our District is doing well with all these 3 Es. All credit to the Vice Presidents of Education of our clubs for their commitment and work done in this space. Thank you, VPEs.

A few of our members are so very driven and committed along their Pathways journey. They truly deserve to be applauded for their high Pathways level completions this Toastmasters year. The top three level completion achievers are:

1. 10 levels completed - Sheila Edens-Brown, EC5, PM5, Toastmasters of Palos Heights (Sheila has also

completed the Pathways mentor program)

- 2. 6 Levels completed Christine Gomez, DL5, PM1, The Lynda Morrill Club
- 3. 5 Levels completed AlyceAnn Crump, DTM, Extreme Possibilities Toastmasters Club

From July 2022 to September 2022, we had 108 level completions for 87 clubs in our district. This is a good achievement. However, it averages to just over 1 level completion per club. I strongly believe we could be doing better.

For District 103 to be a viable district, we would need to achieve a certain number of level completions for each level (Table 1).

Table 2 tells us where we are for the first quarter of the current Toastmasters year, and also where we should be. We are doing extremely well on completions for levels 4 and 5, great job! Keep it up, and let's all encourage and support our fellow members who are working through levels 1, 2 and 3. As you can see, doing the math to achieve our target totals for the year, we should have 15 level 1 completions, and 15 level 2 completions, across D103 every month. With this in mind and knowing your club's composition, I am sure you all can come up with appropriate strategies to complete more levels 1 and 2.

2022 - 2023 District 103 Club Growth Committee

The Club Coach Program is intended to partner experienced Toastmasters with a club that may be struggling. The purpose of this program is to help clubs increase their membership and improve the quality of their meetings. This year, Toastmasters International has revamped the Club Coach program and has added a greater incentive for members to coach clubs.

This 40–90-minute module is divided into two chapters.

Chapter I: Introduction to the Club Coach Program provides an overview of the program for club members, club officers, District leaders, and prospective club coaches.

Chapter II: Becoming a Club Coach looks more deeply at the requirements of the program.

Completion of both chapters is a requirement to participate in the Club Coach Program. Other eligibility requirements include:

Have completed, at a minimum:

- Level 2 in a path, Advanced Leader Bronze, or Advanced Communicator Bronze
- Are not currently coaching any other club
- Are not a current member of the club they wish to coach

 Have not been a member of the club to be coached during the past 6 months

Assuming the prospective club coach meets the eligibility requirements, they will:

- Be appointed by Toastmasters International headquarters to start their club coach term
- Serve as a club coach for a minimum of 6 months, up to a maximum of 2 program years
- Help the club reach Distinguished status (or better) in the Distinguished Club Program (DCP) during their club coach term

Clubs that are interested in needing a coach must meet the following requirements:

- Must have between 3 and 12 members
- Cannot be suspended
- Cannot have 2 club coaches currently appointed

Once a club has reached Distinguished or better, the coach is not only eligible for the coaching credit but also the credit for District Service. For more information, register to attend the club coach training on Thursday, December 1, 2022, at 6:00 pm CST to get more information on being a club coach.

Requirements to be a Club Coach

- Have completed, at a minimum: Level 2 in a path, Advanced Leader Bronze, or Advanced Communicator Bronze
- Are not currently coaching any other club
- Are not a current member of the club they wish to coach
- Have not been a member of the club to be coached during the past 6 months
- Be appointed by Toastmasters International headquarters to start their club coach term
- Serve as a club coach for a minimum of 6 months, up to a maximum of 2 program years
- Help the club reach Distinguished status (or better) in the Distinguished Club Program (DCP) during their club coach term






Below, see a comparison of D103 statistics as of November for current year 2022-23 compared to prior years 2021-22 and 2020-21.

These statistics capture the number of paid clubs; the number of member payments (received in the international website, via Club Central), and the number of distinguished clubs. Note that at this point in the Toastmasters year, there are typically very few clubs who have already achieved Distinguished status (5 of the 10 DCP goals).



Tech Tips

This section of the newsletter is designed to give you, the reader, tips on how to effectively use technology and various technological topics when applicable.

It is getting close to that most wonderful time of the year where sleigh bells and coins in pockets will be jingling. This year, let's take some of those coins and invest in upgrading your technology.

I know a large majority of you will wait until Black Friday or Cyber Monday so you can get the best deals. However, one thing I am urging you to pay close attention to when you are making a computer purchase is the specifications. I realize that many of the specs may look like Greek (or Geekspeak). However, in learning those specifications, you will be able to purchase a computer you can enjoy for years to come.

Just like joining Toastmasters, there has to be a "why". Why should I spend a fair chunk of my hard-earned money on a new computer?

First, let me start with the system requirements for Zoom Virtual Background:

or blur background in Zoom. For Mac OS users, your computer must be on MacOS 10.13 or higher. Processors must be i7 or i9 4th Generation or higher.

However, that is only the tip of the iceberg. You also want to upgrade that computer for security reasons. Older computers have hardware based security holes that can be exploited very easily. Another benefit is more efficient performance. For instance, many of those older machines use platter-based hard drives (HDDs) which transfer data slower than the newer solid state drives (SSDs). Some of those Black Friday specials may have a HDD and 4 GB of (RAM {Random Access Memory}) which may be barely sufficient for very light duty but is woefully inadequate when doing other functions.

It is recommended to purchase a computer with a minimum of 16 GB of RAM. As for processors, look at computers that have a 10th, 11th, or 12th generation i5, i7, or i9 Intel processor. For those who like AMD processors, go for a Ryzen 5xxx or the newer Ryzen 7xxx. MacOS computers would need to have an i7, i9, or the new M1 processor. The memory requirement would be the same.

Speaking of RAM, phrases like DDR4 and DDR5 may not mean anything to most folks but those are the latest forms of memory. DDR5 is the fastest you can get currently. Anything that has specifications for older memory such as DDR3 is not worth purchasing because it will be using older componentry that may have security risks.

After purchasing that new computer, make sure it is updated to the most current patches possible before you start using it. Most of the time, customers don't know whether a computer is imaged with an updated version of the OS and all software. Updating this computer will make sure that any software based security holes are patched before you put this computer on the Internet. This also includes hardware updates. Computers such as HP, Dell, and Lenovo each have tools to easily update the hardware drivers.

DCP Changes

In the past, many of our clubs have had the goals to be Distinguished but are missing the 5 net new members. This prevents the club from officially achieving Distinguished status. As of July 1, 2022, your clubs now have a better chance as becoming Distinguished or better. Enlarge your membership by 3 net members (after replacing any lost members) and get 5 or more goals and your club will be Distinguished. This change runs until July 31, 2024 (two full years).

Now with 3 net new members needed, you can achieve the Distinguished status and bring your club the recognition it deserves.

None of the other requirements have changed. Make sure your club is getting the goals required to complete the Distinguished requirements listed below.

- Distinguished 5 Goals and Net 3 more members as compared to baseline at June 30, 2022
- Select Distinguished 7 Goals and Net 3 more members as compared to baseline at June 30, 2022
- President's Distinguished 9 Goals and Net 3 more members as compared to baseline at June 30, 2022
